

THE SLOOPERS VOYAGE TO AMERICA

The first group of Norwegian Immigrants to America departed Stavanger, Norway — July 4, 1825 or the Sloop - Restoration and these 52 persons entered New York Harbor October 9th -98 days later. Cleng Peerson led this group first to Upstate New York . . . then to this area of Illinois near Norway where the first Permanent Norwegian Settlement was established. Descendants of these Norwegians who came over on the Sloop have formed the Norwegian Slooper Society of America, that meets annually at the Norway Community Center in Norway, Illinois the Sunday nearest to October 9.

I hope the following is somewhat near to what you wanted from me:

Marvin Platten will be the presenter at the annual meeting of the Norwegian Slooper Society of America Oct. 9, 1994. Platten, who, with his wife Marion, were invited as "honored guests" to the 1993 Norwegian Emigration Festival held in Stavangar, Norway, will show a video of one of the main events of this festival: the "Sluppefolket," which is the reenactment of the July 4th.,1825 boarding of the "Restauration" performed by a Norwegian Theatre group. Platten will also tell us about Mr. Hans Storhaug, the director of the Norwegian Emigration Center in Stavanger, Norway. Mr. Storhaug is in charge of this Emigration Festival in Stavangar that is held the second week in June every year. He is very interested in making further contact with our Slooper Society and would love to have as many Sloopers as possible attend this festival in1995 for the 170th. anniversary of the voyage of the "Restauration."

In addition, Marvin will show some video of his visit to Ombo Island in the Stavanger Fjord where his great-great grandfather, Ole Olsen Hetletveit, an original Slooper, was born and farmed until he came to America on the "Restauration." He will share with us how hard it must have been to farm on such rocky and hilly land, which is probably one reason Ole and thousands of other Norwegians came to America.

Marvin Platten is a an Associate Professor at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, Texas. He is "partially retired."

Dan, please feel free to change anything concerning the above. After all, you are the editor and you know what is best for the publication and for the Slooper Society of America.

I am really looking forward to seeing you and the other Sloopers, Dan, You and Pat sure showed Marion and I a great time last summer! Unfortunately, Marion will not be able to accompany me on this trip in October as she will be heavily involved in planning for a celebrity auction for our classical music station at that time.

After we left Illinois last summer, we drove to Decorah, Iowa where we visited the Vesterheim, the Norwegian-American Museum. Here, we learned that Cleng Peerson is buried in the Our Saviors Lutheran Church cemetery in Clifton, Texas, not to far from Waco. As you probably know, Cleng Peerson was responsible for bringing Norwegians to Texas in the early the 1800s. We plan to drive to Clifton, hopefully, in the near future.

As of this writing, she is finally able to walk without support of some kind. While in Minnesota we visited some of my cousins who farm in the northern part of the state. I went haying with them. Things sure have changed since I was a kid when we had to pitch-fork the hay into the wagon!

Another letter waiting for us when we finally arrived home was one from the Wiiks written before they left for the United States. You met them, I'm sure when they came to Ill. We are sorry that our schedules didn't mesh so that we could meet them. We also got a mailing from Wayne Borchsenius. He sent information about books about Cleng Peerson authored by Alfred Hauge that Wayne mentioned to us while we were all at the Norway Store. And what a store that is! I'm looking forward to seeing him as well.
